Itinerary for Governor's School Visit to Dr. Robert White's Organic Farm

Organic farming methods combine scientific knowledge of ecology and modern <u>technology</u> with <u>traditional farming</u> practices based on naturally occurring biological processes. Organic farming methods are studied in the field of <u>agroecology</u>. While conventional agriculture uses synthetic pesticides and water-soluble synthetically purified fertilizers, organic farmers are restricted by regulations to using natural pesticides and fertilizers. The principal methods of organic farming include <u>crop rotation</u>, <u>green manures</u> and <u>compost</u>, <u>biological pest</u> <u>control</u>, and mechanical <u>cultivation</u>. These measures use the natural environment to enhance agricultural productivity: <u>legumes</u> are planted to fix <u>nitrogen</u> into the soil, <u>natural insect predators</u> are encouraged, crops are rotated to confuse pests and renew soil, and natural materials such as <u>potassium bicarbonate^[25]</u> and <u>mulches</u> are used to control disease and <u>weeds</u>. Hardier plants are generated through <u>plant breeding</u> rather than genetic engineering.
