# President's Message

Dear Fellow Retirees,

You may recall that I have been involved in on-the-job training as to what ETSURA is and does. I have learned that "Eat and Chat" was for many years called "Dutch Lunch" and held Ryan's at Family Steakhouse. Picnics were held at the Jonesborough home of Emeritus President Burgin E. Dossett and usually catered Firehouse by Restaurant.

In 1991 the (ETSU) Institute for Continuing Learning was started under Dr. Carol Anderson with programs aimed at the interests of retirees. It now continues as the Alliance for Continued Learning (ACL). A travel program was also started that year with the Eastern Caribbean Isles as its destination. Although that trip fell through, subsequent trips (Alaska, England, Canadian Rockies, the Caribbean) were apparently successful, as the booking agency donated \$600 to the Endowed Scholarship Fund.

1992 the **ETSURA** board established a life membership fee (in lieu of annual dues) that would be tax-deductible in the year of payment. The lump sum fee (\$100/person or \$150/couple) would be held in escrow, with the earnings used for ETSURA expenses. On operational member's death, the sum would be transferred to the Scholarship Fund, making it tax-deductible. Annual dues, by contrast, are not deductible. The board felt the income generated would be adequate, even if a

significant number of members chose this option.

From ETSURA's inception in 1988 (when postage was 25 cents), annual dues have been \$5/person. Last year (when postage was 49 cents) the board increased dues to \$10/person, which has helped meet operational expenses. A major expense is the printing and postage costs of this newsletter and other brochures.

Activities that have occurred since the last newsletter include the Eat and Chat session with Dr. Fred Alsop, the ETSU Memorial Service, and the Service Project with the Women's Soccer team (see accompanying articles). Dr. Alsop's talk on the Eagle Nest Cam Project was very wellattended, in part because it was a timely topic (with hatchings only recently taking place) and in part because retirees, as everyone knows, are interested in watching over....nest eggs!

Our next event is the Annual Picnic to be held Friday, June 17th at 11 a.m. at the new Food City meeting room (see accompanying notice). The increase in annual dues, especially with donations from Eastman Credit Union and University Advancement, has allowed us to subsidize about 50% of the actual costs of the Picnic and Annual Banquet.

We will have Geoff Stunkard talk on the Carter RR Museum/ Heritage Days at our Sept. Eat and Chat (see notice). And, we will hold our Annual Banquet on Friday, Oct. 14 at 11 a.m. at the Johnson City Country Club. It may be difficult, but we hope to match last year's program on the Tweetsie Trail, which was apparently very well received.

I've been chastised for being too verbose, so I'll stop here. However, there is still much to discuss, but I'll save it for the next installment. Keep in touch--otherwise, we're guessing as to how to better serve you--our extended ETSU family.

A memorial service was held in Brown Hall Auditorium on April 7, 2016 at 7 p.m. to commemorate members of the ETSU community who had passed away during the year. Names of the departed were alternately read by SGA President Alex Cassell, Faculty Senate President Dr. Virginia Foley, and Staff Senate President Whitlock. The names included four students, six faculty/staff members, and--of interest ETSURA--thirty-five retirees. The concluded ceremony with closing anthem by the University Choral. Joe Sherlin (pictured), Vice President for Student Affairs, said he hoped this would become an annual event.

# **April Eat and Chat**

About 30 people attended this event at the Golden Corral Restaurant, where Dr. Fred Alsop of ETSU's Department of Biological Sciences spoke on his Eagles' Nest Cam Project. This project provides live, as well as historical, videos of two American bald eagle nests in Johnson City

and Bluff City.

The videos can be accessed online by clicking on the Eagle Cameras link in the blue section at the very bottom of the ETSU home web page. You can also access the videos through the Department of Biological Sciences website.

In formulating the project, visits were made to other Eagle Nest projects, one being that at Berry College in Rome, Georgia. The process is involved and includes permission getting from landowners, the setting up instrumentation, and acquiring sponsors.

Many businesses and agencies (credited on the ETSU Web site) were indispensable in getting the project going. Streaming fees alone cost \$2,500 per nesting season per nest. There is a link on the website where donations can be made, and some checks were written at the end of the presentation.

Residents of over 160 countries have viewed ETSU's camera videos with over 600,000 views of the Johnson City Camera (including 356,000 unique viewers). One useful feature of these cameras is the ability to zoom in and out, to cut down on the swaying effect when the wind is blowing. Dr. Alsop mentioned that over 250 pounds of sticks are used for each nest each year, resulting in nests that may potentially weigh over a ton.

## **Second Harvest Food Bank**
